“StreetLeaders are losing motivation for school due to distractions and isolation within their households,” recently shared by staff at our meeting. The lockdown has made it very challenging for our young leaders to stay engaged in serving children while battling a variety of external factors affecting them.

StreetLeaders are high school students who are provided meaningful employment and volunteer opportunities throughout the year.

As I listen to the many challenges affecting our children and youth, it stirs me with feelings of despair and I wonder how we can do more in spite of the restrictions.

In Psalm 43:5 states “Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation and my God.”

This sentiment is repeated a few times in the Psalms and the writer does not hold back his feelings, but also leads us to his resolve to hope in God. It was remarkable to hear our staff share about the many challenges, but ultimately they chose to resolve to hope in what God is doing in our midst. God is at work in our resilient Staff and StreetLeaders sharing the gospel through creative virtual activities for our children.

Our virtual Sliced UP cooking class has been beneficial for the children.



One of our StreetLeaders informed me that his younger sister feels more empowered to cook; she makes her own meals using the recipes she has learned at Sliced UP.

Before cooking begins, Ashley, our Ministry Supervisor, leads the group in a mindfulness activity as a way for the children to ‘check-in’ with how they’re feeling that day. One parent came onto the virtual class with their child and said they were thankful for the mindfulness

activities. They wanted their child to speak about their emotions so they can better learn to manage them on a day to day basis.

This is just one way we continue to support our children’s mental health.


