tenants in other rooms."

These were the words of a single mother, a refugee, as she tearfully shared with me her struggles with childcare and finding work in Toronto while trying to register her children for our summer camp.

That moment offered me a glimpse into the challenges that many immigrants and refugees face in our communities, which are often not seen.

In the recent Child and Family Poverty Report 2024, Immigrant children had a poverty rate of 21% compared to 12.6% for nonimmigrant children. Newcomer children had even higher poverty rates: 38.1% of children who immigrated with their families between 2020 and 2021 lived in lowincome households.

This past summer, we aimed to be a part of the solution to help families overcome the barriers that poverty creates. Led by our missionaries and empowering our StreetLeaders, we set out to enroll as many children as possible and provide them with the best experience. For six weeks, we created opportunities for children to build literacy skills, explore places like Warsaw Caves, Treetop Trekking, Downey's Farm, Toronto Island, and the list goes on. At the heart of our summer camp was our Bible theme,

"Who's your King?", learning about the kind of King Jesus is.

We are excited about the start of our AfterSchool program to continue to create possibilities for children to learn and youth to grow in their leadership skills.

It was a lot of fun and gave me the opportunity to reconnect with others."

not experts, just ministry workers
and high school students saying "yes"

and trusting God's grace but we have done our best to support their family. The first week was rough. Kahmar is semi verbal and we struggled to help him through his meltdowns. But little by little he started to open up. Now Kahmar sneaks over to the alphabet magnets to spell out words. He even reads at a Grade 2 level. He has joined in our camp chant too. When we shout "Hey Camp Truth" he happily echoes it back with a big smile. He has become a favourite among the leaders and we are so grateful to God for the joy Kahmar brings.

MEET YEEZY — FROM CAMPER TO PROGRAM LEADER

Emmanuela Odia, or "Yeezy", has been part of UrbanPromise Toronto since she was six years old. She grew up at camp, became a StreetLeader as a teen, and now this is her first summer as Program Leader at Camp Victory.



Yeezy runs the daily schedule, supports the StreetLeaders, and works closely with kids aged 5 to 10. She loves teaching them about God and leading worship. Her energy and sense of humour light up camp, and she's great at planning activities that make the experience fun...just like the one she had growing up.

Now in her second year of university, Yeezy is giving back to the community that shaped her to help build the next generation of leaders.

Sarah, the Ministry Supervisor at Camp Victory, says: "Yeezy has a very energetic and joyful personality. She's also funny and excels in planning activities for the kids and does her best to make camp an amazing experience, similar to the experience she had at camp as a child."

Q. What inspired you to become a Program Leader?

I grew up with UrbanPromise from camper to StreetLeader, and now Program Leader. Both of my siblings have followed the same path. Watching them lead and pour into younger kids inspired me to do the same. This role feels right to me; it's my chance to give back to the community that has been such a big part of my life and help keep that cycle going.

- Q. How has leading camp helped you grow? This summer pushed me to grow in responsibility and work with people. Creating the schedule and sticking to it taught me to stay organized, think ahead, and adapt when things go off plan. For example, I planned a relay race but the kids were tired so I switched to making paper airplanes. That kind of flexibility helps me beyond camp.
 - **Q.** What keeps you going when things get tough? I pray or ask my Ministry Supervisors for advice, their support and Sarah's mentorship inspire me. My hope for the kids is that they have fun, feel cared for, and remember me as someone who believed in them.
 - Q. Any Bible verses that guide you? Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." James 4:7–"Submit to God. Resist the devil and he will flee."

They remind me that I'm not doing this alone. I lean on God's strength and I trust that He guides every step.
